Greetings to our 3rd- and 4th-year Philosophy specialists and majors:

I'm writing to tell you about a special philosophy course called *The Socrates Project*, which you may not yet have heard about. We think it offers a unique educational opportunity that will be of interest to our best students in their 3^{rd} or (ideally) 4^{th} year.

The Socrates Project (PHL489Y5Y) is a full year course that has two components.

The first component of the course is a seminar led by a faculty member which will meet once a week for 2hrs during the fall and once every other week for 2hrs in the Winter. The second component is the writing of a paper for an independent study during the winter. Roughly 25% of the seminar will focus on the methods and challenges of teaching philosophy. Roughly 75% of the seminar will focus on a study of the topics you will write about during second semester. Each student will choose a paper topic, assign several readings for the seminar, and then lead the seminar discussion of the topic. Guest faculty who work on these topics will visit the seminar from time to time. During winter term you will write a seminar paper on your chosen topic under the supervision of a faculty member whose research is in the relevant area. Late in winter you will present your paper at an undergraduate research conference.

Secondly, you will serve as a TA for either PHL103H5S or PHL113H5S during the Winter session (January –April). You will attend all of the PHL103H5S or PHL113H5S lectures and teach one tutorial section of 20-25 students, meeting with them for 1 hour. You will grade their papers, hold office hours, and meet with the professors and head TA (a graduate student) as needed. You will be paid the current TA hourly rate.

We can accept up to 8 students. The Socrates Project provides an extraordinary opportunity for high-achieving students to participate in an intensive course with a strong experiential learning component.
